

HIGHLIGHTS of the 99th Annual Meeting May 7 – 9, 2019 Portsmouth, Virginia

- **President Jean Gilpin** welcomed 144 attendees to the meeting hosted by The Elizabeth River Garden Club and thanked Betty Jo Gwaltney, Martha Perkins, Shirley Sondej, and all members of Elizabeth River for hosting a wonderful meeting. **Martha Perkins, Co-chair of the Annual Meeting**, welcomed everyone to Portsmouth. **President of The Elizabeth River Garden Club, Betty Jo Gwaltney**, introduced **Mayor John L. Rowe**. Mayor Rowe welcomed the GCV back to Portsmouth as the Board of Governors was hosted is Portsmouth in 1931. Mayor Rowe noted that he was very impressed with the GCV Fellowships and awards.
- **President Gilpin** proclaimed, "Today marks the day we begin celebrating our Centennial!" President Gilpin recognized the past GCV Presidents and stated members need to carry on the traditions and aspirations of the GCV.
- **President Gilpin** announced Bartlett Tree Experts would be the main Centennial sponsor! Bartlett shares the same values as the GCV. Their support will include 12 in-kind support workdays and are hoping to focus their efforts on the GCV Restoration properties.
- First Vice President and Chairman of the Centennial Steering Committee Missy Buckingham announced: "The Centennial merchandise is here!" Scarves, ties, bow ties, a Centennial Waterford ornament, and Tervis Tumblers were available for purchase at the meeting.
- The 2019 Massy Medal for Distinguished Achievement was awarded to Judy Perry, GCV Historian, GCV Restoration Fellowships Chair, and member of The Elizabeth River Garden Club. The Massie Medal for Distinguished Achievement is given to an individual member or member club of the GCV who has served with unusual dedication and distinction.
- The 2019 **de Lacy Gray Memorial Medal for Conservation** was presented to Anne Meade Beals of The Rappahannock Valley Garden Club. This award is given to an individual member or member club of the GCV in recognition of outstanding effort to further the knowledge of our natural resources and to encourage their wise use.
- The 2019 **Bessie Bocock Carter Conservation Award** was given to the Winchester-Clarke Garden Club for their Abrams Creek Wetlands Preserve project. Barbara Bandyke, President of

Winchester-Clarke, received the award of \$7000 presented by GCV Conservation Awards Chairman Heidi James.

- **Conservation Fellow Brynn Cook** gave a very informative presentation on "Foraging Specialization in Polluted Atmospheres."
- GCV Landscape Architect Mr. Will Rieley gave an excellent presentation titled "A Short Look Back at What We have Done in Virginia."
- Captain M.K. Nunley, Nurse Corps, USN, Retired, gave a fascinating presentation about activities on a US Navy aircraft carrier. George W. Watkins shared delightful pilot stories and facts about the Port of Virginia, including Virginia's imports and exports.
- **Treasurer Vicky Alexander** presented an abbreviated Treasurer's report, including the GCV budget for 2019-2020 and noted that the GCV is in great shape through the end of the current fiscal year. **Finance Committee Chairman Tricia McDaniel** communicated the Finance Committee supervises the expenses of the GCV including overseeing the budget and investments. Tricia reviewed the current investment portfolios of the GCV. The Finance Committee promises to be good stewards of the GCV finances.
- First Vice President and Chairman of the Centennial Steering Committee Missy Buckingham announced "Let the countdown begin!" launching us into the celebration of 100 years. The Centennial packet was reviewed and will be sent to the Centennial Club Liaisons which includes a press release and save-the-date cards. On May 13, 1920, Laura Wheelwright, President of the James River Garden Club, hosted a meeting with the eight original member clubs, and a motion was passed to create a federation of garden clubs now known as the GCV. Participants are encouraged to use their free time to visit the seven nearby GCV Restoration properties or other local points of interest.

The Evening Gala with husbands and guests will offer a spectacular evening of fabulous food, drink, and flowers at the VMHC and the highlight of the evening will be the grand opening of our featured exhibition...*A Landscape Saved: Garden Club of Virginia at 100.*

Thursday, May 14, 2020

Famed floral designer Paula Pryke will be our featured speaker.

Each member club will have the opportunity to create a flower arrangement displayed at the VMHC during the Founders Day Celebrations. Please come to all or as many events that you can. These Founders Day Celebrations will highlight the efforts of those who have come before us while launching us into our next century in style. • Second Vice-President Catherine Madden introduced Adele Smith, Daffodil Day Chairman. Adele delighted all with a presentation of "By the Numbers" representing facts and figures associated with a very successful Daffodil Day. Adele thanked the GCV Membership Committee for hosting a new member orientation during the event and thanked Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens for their Facebook posts and information in their membership newsletter. Jeanette Cadwallender was awarded best in show for her 'Green Arrow' daffodil entry. The Daffodil Show will again be hosted at Lewis Ginter next year. Lilies in Bloom Chairman Nina Mustard announced the show would be held at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Richmond on June 18, 2019.

Monday, June 17 - Registration and workrooms open
An Evening with Margot Shaw, Editor of *Flower Magazine* and author of *Living Floral: Entertaining and Decorating with Flowers* will be hosted at the KV House.
Registration is required for the Margot Shaw event.
Tuesday, June 18 - Registration and workrooms will be open until 10:00 a.m.
The Show will open to the public at 1:00 p.m.

Please note both Inter Club Artistic Classes are full. The show is dedicated to the memory of Katherine Beale.

• Artistic Design Chair Tory Willis noted the Artistic Design Committee has been very busy with the flower and photography workshop, Symposium, and Daffodil Day over the last year. A special thanks were given to everyone who helped with revising the judging process and the revisions on modern designs. There will be no Symposium in 2020, but the committee is hoping to host an event during that time frame. There will be an opportunity for each club to create an arrangement displayed during the Founders Day Celebration at the Virginia Museum of History and Culture featuring distinct periods. Each club is encouraged to participate.

Corresponding Secretary Janet Rosser thanked everyone for their generous donations to the Annual Fund. Janet then introduced the following Committee Chairmen for whom she serves as Board Liaison. **GCV Historian and Custodian of Records Judy Perry** reminded everyone to write their two-year club history after their term as president and email them to Judy or bring them to the KVH to be placed in each club's box. Ann Heller will place them on the GCV

website. The Humorous Memories Project continues, and the deadline for stories is June 1. Over 100 stories have been received. Please encourage your club to submit stories. Names will not be used, but please include your name and club for contact information. Please send these to Judy at <u>gcvhistorian1920@gmail.com</u>. Judy reported that she had been contacted by Architect Mr. Liam O'Connor, who is designing the British Normandy Memorial that will be unveiled in 2020. Mr. O'Connor had noticed the plaque installed at a church listing the names of GCV husbands and sons that had been lost in WWII. The GCV had adopted the little war-torn town of Ver-sur-Mer, a commune in the Normandy region, and restored ten stained glass windows in a 12th-century church located there. The town honored the GCV by naming a street the "Rue de Garden Club of Virginia, USA." Judy will be writing a Journal article about this. The story of GCV's involvement with Ver-sur-Mer can be found online as written in Follow the Green Arrow, Volume 1. Journal Editorial Board Chairman Julie Grover announced the Journal would be redesigned and the new format will be revealed in the June 2020 edition that will be devoted to the Centennial. The new Journal will feature more and larger photographs, more white space, and issues with themes such as floral designs, the environment, garden legacies, and travel. There will be more focus on member club projects, member gardens, and profiles on experts and organizations in GCV-related fields. Julie asked each GCV committee to appoint a Journal liaison and forward their name to her by June 1. Journal Advertising Chairman Lea Shuba asked members to reach out to her with leads for potential *Journal* advertisers. There are advertising packets available, and Lea noted there is more success with a local connection. Please remember to advertise club events and club items for sale in the Journal. When shopping, please tell participating businesses that you saw their advertisements in the Journal.

- Conservation Chairman Carrie Dorsey reported the Committee has been very busy and Legislation Day was very successful with a great turn out. The Committee reviewed the Governor's proposed budget that allocated funds for conservation and natural resource programs representing a historic increase this year. A bill was passed to require Coal Ash Clean Up at the four unlined coal ash ponds in Virginia. The GCV continues its affiliation with the Virginia Conservation Network and Virginia Forever, which are excellent resources. The Committee will write a letter to the EPA on behalf of the GCV supporting the protection of the highest standards of water quality and to maintain the integrity of the Clean Water Act.
- Back to Nature Horticulture, Hiking and Conservation Forum Trees: Canopy of Conservation at Natural Bridge - Conservation Chairman Carrie Dorsey reported The Conservation Forum Committee would be hosting the Conservation Forum in conjunction with the State Parks and Horticulture Committees as part of the Centennial Celebration on September 24 – 25 at Natural Bridge State Park. There will be four speakers on September 25 with the topic of "Trees: Canopy of Conservation." The speakers include Frazier Armstong of Capital Trees, Elizabeth Brantly of Bartlett Trees, Eric Wiseman of Virginia Tech Big Tree Program, and Andrew Moore, author of *Pawpaw: In Search of America's Forgotten Fruit.* State Parks Chairman Nina Mustard presented the schedule of events. Monday, September 23 will be a set-up day. Tuesday, September 24 will include the Native Plants Horticulture Show, group and self-guided hikes, and geocaching. Bartlett Trees will have an event for children, and there will be a tree planting instead of a ribbon cutting. A Sip and See is scheduled from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Horticulture Chairman Wendy Walker encouraged members to bring blooms to the horticulture show and noted there is no advanced registration except for the Picnic in the Park exhibitors. The Picnic in the Park class requires individuals to

bring a food item from their garden that will be judged. Please save green glass bottles for the horticulture display. The signup is available on the GCV website.

- Horticulture Chairman Wendy Walker thanked everyone for bringing the horticulture "Storm Survivors" display. Please inform the Horticulture Committee about what topics members want to read about in the *Journal*. Horticulture Field Day will be held May 22-23 and is sold out. The 2019 Horticulture Award of Merit winners are Susan Garrett, The Nansemond River Garden Club, and Sherry Leffel, The Spotswood Garden Club.
- GCV Recording Secretary Kris Carbone presented the Membership Committee report for Chairman Diane Wilkinson. The Three Rivers Garden Club has increased their membership to 25, and they helped The Ashland Garden Club with their 2019 HGW tour. Membership Orientation was held at Daffodil Day and was informative and interesting with the strong support of GCV chairmen and staff. The Membership Committee will request nominations for GCV honorary membership from member clubs in the near future.
- Common Wealth Committee Chairman Karla MacKimmie reminded everyone the Common Wealth Award provides annual grants to the community projects of the GCV's member clubs. The 2019 finalist will be written about in the *Journal* and voted on by the member clubs in the fall. The winner will be announced at the Board of Governors in October. Congratulations to the two finalists for the 2019 Common Wealth Award: Peter Paul Development Center and Playground Enhancement submitted by the Boxwood Garden Club, and The Discovery Trail: Connecting Children with Nature submitted by the Mill Mountain Garden Club.
- **Restoration Chairman Anne Baldwin** reported each member of the Committee serves as a liaison to several of the Restoration properties. The Committee travels across the state several times per year to visit the properties on a rotating basis. Members of the Committee would love to visit each of the member clubs and give a 30 or 50-minute presentation. They can also visit and provide an update on Restoration and answer questions about the activities of the Committee. The GCV Restoration Research Fellowships were awarded. Dania Khlaifat, the Rudy J. Favretti Fellow, will be researching the historic landscape at Farmington Country Club. The William D. Rieley Fellow, Hayden Hammons, will be researching Mount Airy in Warsaw, VA. There will be special events planned at some Restoration properties in honor of the GCV Centennial with information to follow. Anne presented an opportunity for a special gift from the GCV to The British Normandy Memorial in honor of the 75th anniversary of D Day. The history of the GCV's support of war-torn Europe in WWII in the 1940s was presented. The Restoration Committee recommended the GCV send \$20,000 from Restoration funds to support landscaping at The British Normandy Memorial, and the GCV Board voted to support this. A vote was taken, and it carried unanimously.
- **Development Committee Chairman Sue Rosser** thanked the Centennial sponsors in addition to Bartlett Trees. These sponsors include Towne Bank, Hilldrup and the McDaniel family, IMVA, Valley Protein, Robert and Lucy Huff, and Grelen Nursery. "The top ten reasons of what the GCV does for me" was given and everyone was reminded of the elevator cards that were left for each attendee on the tables promoting the GCV's positive impact on Virginia.

- GCV Executive Director Lynn McCashin proclaimed the ladies of the GCV have always had their own way of getting things done, are relentless, and have been able to grow with the sophistication of our knowledge! Great examples include fighting against billboards, the protection of the Goshen Pass, and the development of position papers. We must carry on our mission.
- Kent-Valentine House Committee Chairman Jody Branch thanked Lynn McCashin, Quan McGough, and Lee Mondesir for keeping the KVH running smoothly. All current projects at the KVH will be finished by summer. There is new paint, a repaired roof, new carpet, new upholstery, refinished furniture, and soon the floors will be refinished. There are currently two pier mirrors that have been conserved, two that are in the process of being conserved, and one in the pipeline. The landscape will be attended to and ready for the fall. The dogwood planted in honor of Margaret Bemiss was filled with blooms during Historic Garden Week, and the 'Green Arrow' daffodils bloomed in the pots out front. Please bring members to visit the KVH.
- The Directors at Large (Bettie Guthrie, Meg Laughon, Anne Harrison Harris, Debbie Lewis, Tuckie Westfall, Ellen Upton) presented the accomplishments of the member clubs. The DALS reminded everyone that the 6 DALs are here to help the member club presidents. There will be a Presidents Day hosted on June 3, 2019, from 10:30 a.m. 2:30 p.m. at the KVH. DALs Debbie Lewis, Ellen Upton, and Meg Laughon with the help of 2nd Vice President Catherine Madden sang the song "Red Roses," and each president was given a red rose. Tuckie Westfall, Meg Laughon, and Ellen Upton are ending their terms and were thanked for their service by President Gilpin.
- **First Vice President Missy Buckingham** presented the Nominations Committee report for Chairman Ann Gordon Evans. The nominations for Directors at Large include:

District 2: Fran Carden-Albemarle Garden Club District 5: Laura Francis-The Hunting Creek Garden Club District 6: Debbie Bonnewell-Harborfront Garden Club

President Gilpin read Article VIII, Section 8.3 of the Garden Club of Virginia Bylaws which states: Nominations made by this committee do not preclude nominations from the floor, provided consent of the candidate has been obtained in advance. No nominations from the floor were presented. The May 2019 –May 2021 slate for the three Directors at Large was accepted as presented.

• Chairman of Strategic Planning Candy Crosby communicated the Committee has had nine meetings since 2018 and shared the issues and recommendations which will be presented to the GCV Board of Directors for their discussion. These include:

Ownership of HGW including the trademark and copyright of HGW HGW accounting – best practices provided for member clubs on how to handle HGW GCV Finance - create a five-year budget and hire a consultant to determine if our level of spending is sustainable.

GCV Communications - establish a Communications Committee to oversee the President's monthly newsletter, *The Year in Review*, the website, and social media. GCV *Journal* - Explore the possibility of upgrading the design

GCV Membership - Investigate whether new membership categories could be added

GCV Nominating and Leadership - Create a simple electronic survey to identify potential leaders and talents of club members GCV Member Club Presidents - Club Presidents invite their respective Director at Large and the GCV President to attend one of their membership meetings during their term

- Claire Mellinger, Albermarle Garden Club has been an integral part of GCV events by creating a photography class at Daffodil Day and Symposium. Claire noted member photography is now included in the President's *Membership News*. Symposium had six classes and 36 entries, and Daffodil Day had four classes and 16 entries. The photography workshop was a great time, and participants used their cell phone cameras. This workshop may be hosted again in 2020. In 2020, Claire will join forces with the Restoration Committee and create a photography show called "A Sense of Place." The schedule will be sent to all members. This will be a juried show displayed at the KVH.
- Historic Garden Week Chairman Stephie Broadwater thanked everyone for all their time and energy to pull off HGW. Stephie visited seven tours and noted the beautiful weather. Because HGW concluded on May 4, no reports are currently available with results expected by mid-June. KISS or Keep it Simple Sisters was presented encouraging clubs to focus on what HGW is – a home and garden tour. Each club should take a fresh look at how tours are planned including the number of volunteers, the number of arrangements, and the number of houses. When planning a tour, the number of homes should be based on the available resources. The HGW state level is focused on social media and encouraged clubs to do the same. All but one tour has a Facebook page and all but two have an Instagram presence. Facebook followers have had an increase of 20%, and Instagram followers have increased by 42%. The state Instagram account is @historicgardenweek, and the local tours are @historicgardenweekfredicksburg (example.) Please like and comment on Facebook and Instagram. This year was the first ever mention of HGW by the Wall Street Journal! HGW was also seen in Virginia Living, Garden and Gun, Albermarle magazine and other publications. We have a continued relationship with Flower Magazine and a writer from Architectural Digest attended. There will be a significant update to the Insiders Guide, which will include job descriptions of key roles. The best practices on tracking attendance include using a clicker at one or two of the homes, and every visitor should be counted including state pass holders. The state HGW Committee has been working very hard over the last two years and has made two recommendations to the GCV Board. These include the tour change request process and a change to the GCV bylaws of member clubs annual responsibilities associate the HGW. It is also the Committee's job to view HGW as a statewide event, not just single tours. HGW is going to be organized into geographic regions instead of the current districts. These regions include the east, west, north, south, and central regions. A handout was shared titled "Historic Garden Week by Day" showing a layout of how many tours are scheduled on each day. Tour proceeds can be affected by too much competition on a single day, bad weather, and gaps between regional tour days. If you would like to change your tour day, please contact the HGW State Chairman. An announcement was made that a new database project will be started to include tour histories, and this will occur in phases. In addition, there will be an update to the economic impact study that was completed in 2014. The photograph for the cover of the 2020 Guidebook has been taken, and it fits perfectly into the Centennial year. You are going to love it! Tricia Garner, Rappahannock Valley Garden Club, will be the 2019 - 2021 HGW State Chairman.

- Virginia State Parks Committee Chairman Nina Mustard reported the GCV is in year four of our five-year, \$500,000 funding commitment to the State Parks. A slide show was presented depicting the history, attendance, and spending at Virginia State Parks. Nina noted a total of 21 member clubs partnered with 23 State Parks, and 12 grants were given in 2019. Nina also shared slides of projects funded by the GCV Centennial State Park commitment. Everyone was encouraged to attend the event at Natural Bridge on September 24 25.
- Annual and Board of Governors Meetings Chairman Sydney Jordan thanked members of The Elizabeth River Garden Club including Co-Chairs Martha Perkins and Shirley Sondej for planning a wonderful Annual Meeting. Susie Rawles, James River Garden Club, thanked Elizabeth River and noted they had set the bar high! Susie read a poem and invited attendees to the 100th Annual Meeting in Richmond on May 12, 2020.

Director at Large Debbie Lewis led the group in an opening prayer.

Martha Perkins, Co-Chairman of the Annual Meeting, welcomed everyone to Portsmouth. President of The Elizabeth River Garden Club, Betty Jo Gwaltney, introduced Mayor John L. Rowe. Mayor Rowe welcomed the GCV back to Portsmouth as the Board of Governors was hosted is Portsmouth in 1931. Mayor Rowe noted that he was very impressed with the GCV Fellowships and awards.

Recording Secretary Kris Carbone called the roll. **Parliamentarian Linda Consolvo** established that a quorum was present.

Motion: Anne Vanderwarker moved to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the 99th GCV Board of Governors meeting held in October 2019. Tricia McDaniel seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously.

President Gilpin thanked Betty Jo Gwaltney, Martha Perkins, Shirley Sondej, and all members of The Elizabeth River Garden Club for hosting a wonderful meeting. Jean noted what a lovely evening it was on the Carrie B. President Gilpin presented important points in the history of the GCV and said that we should carry on the traditions and aspirations of the GCV. **President Gilpin** proclaimed, "Today marks the day we begin celebrating our Centennial!" President Gilpin recognized the past GCV Presidents and presented them with a GCV Centennial scarf.

Treasurer Vicky Alexander presented an abbreviated Treasurer's report including the current fiscal year report and the proposed GCV budget for 2019 – 2020. There are two interest-bearing accounts with Union Bank &Trust in Richmond with a total of \$380,639 as of April 30, 2019. The GCV has two endowment accounts. Investment Management of Virginia (IMVA) manages one account with a total of \$5,419,674

as of April 30. IMVA manages the GCV Endowment and restricted funds. Darrell and King manage the other account with a total of \$1,671,920 as of April 30. The Darrell and King account contains the Restoration and State Parks funds. The current liabilities include accounts payable and the Centennial State Parks Project with total liabilities of \$10,114 as of April 30. Vicky noted the GCV is in a great position to end the fiscal year.

The GCV Board of Directors reviewed and approved the 13-page annual budget and also approved a motion for the presentation of an abbreviated budget. Vicky reviewed the process of creating the budget and noted the full budget is available to anyone who would like to see it. A copy of the summarized budget was provided to each attendee. A summarized GCV operating budget for 2019-2020 was presented, and it was noted that dues have not changed since 2008. The total funding for the budget will be \$1,398,842. The total projected revenue is \$1,305,761, including line item 4900 – Centennial funding. The GCV projected expenses is \$1,844,979 with management and general expenses at \$217,144. The total projected is \$2,083,108. There is enough funding to cover our anticipated expenses, and we will be able to forward fund for 2020-2021. The budget does show a net cash flow of -\$7,705, but the Centennial donations will cover the shortfall. Vicky Alexander made the following motion:

Motion: Madame President, I move that the GCV vote to approve the budget as presented for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2019, and ending on June 30, 2020. Bettie Guthrie seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously.

Finance Committee Chairman Tricia McDaniel reviewed the responsibilities of the Finance Committee, including the budget, investments, insurance matters, and an annual audit of the GCV accounts. Tricia explained the IMVA endowment account includes monies from the GCV Endowment Fund, the GCV Conservation Fund, the Common Wealth Award Fund, the Symposia Fund, and the Kent-Valentine House Fund. Darrell and King manage the funds for the GCV Restoration projects. The GCV has an investment policy that both firms follow when investing our funds. The Finance Committee conducts annual reviews of the investment firms. As of March 31, 2019, the GCV Endowment Fund invested with IMVA totaled \$5,340,330. The GCV Restoration Fund with Darrell and King totaled \$1,798,674 as of March 31. The Finance Committee promises to be good stewards of the GCV finances.

First Vice-President and Chairman of the Centennial Steering Committee Missy Buckingham announced "Let the countdown begin!" launching us into the celebration of 100 years. The Centennial Club Liaisons have met several times as a group to bring back information about the Centennial to their clubs. The Centennial packet was reviewed and will be sent to the Centennial Club Liaisons which includes a press release and save-the-date cards. On May 13, 1920, Laura Wheelwright, President of the James River Garden Club, hosted a meeting with the eight original member clubs, and a motion was passed to create a federation of garden clubs now known as the GCV. The Centennial Celebration Founders Day events include:

The 100th Annual Meeting will be hosted by the James River Garden Club.

An evening reception will be hosted at the Kent-Valentine House for those arriving early but not attending the Annual Meeting. The evening event will showcase the renovations of our beautiful headquarters and provide an opportunity to socialize with GCV friends from around the state and see the location of the Time Capsule.

Wednesday, May 13, 2020

Founders Day events will begin at the Virginia Museum of History and Culture with a presentation by Thomas Woltz, Landscape Architect.

A Luncheon will be offered at the grand and glorious Marble Hall at the adjacent Virginia Museum of Fine Arts.

Participants are encouraged to use their free time to visit the seven nearby GCV Restoration properties or other local points of interest.

The Evening Gala with husbands and guests will offer a spectacular evening of fabulous food, drink, and flowers at the VMHC. The highlight of the evening will be the grand opening of our featured exhibition...*A Landscape Saved: Garden Club of Virginia at 100.*

Thursday, May 14, 2020

Famed floral designer Paula Pryke will be the featured speaker.

Each member club will have the opportunity to create a flower arrangement displayed at the VMHC during the Founders Day Celebrations. Please come to all or as many events that you can. These Founders Day Celebrations will highlight the efforts of those who have come before us while launching us into our next century in style. Please bring this message back to club members and make plans to be there.

Second Vice-President Catherine Madden introduced **Adele Smith, Daffodil Day Chairman**. Adele presented "By the Numbers" representing facts and figures associated with a very successful Daffodil Day. Adele thanked the GCV Membership Committee for hosting a new member orientation during the event and thanked Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens for their Facebook posts and information in their membership newsletter. Jeanette Cadwallender was awarded best in show for her 'Green Arrow' daffodil entry. The Daffodil Show will again be hosted at Lewis Ginter next year. Lilies in Bloom Chairman Nina Mustard announced the show would be held at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Richmond on June 18, 2019.

Monday, June 17, 2019

Registration and workrooms open.

An Evening with Margot Shaw, Editor of *Flower Magazine* and author of *Living Floral: Entertaining and Decorating with Flowers* will be hosted at the KV House. Registration is required for the Margot Shaw event.

Tuesday, June 18, 2019

Registration and workrooms will be open until 10:00 a.m.

The Show will open to the public at 1:00 p.m.

Please note both Inter Club Artistic Classes are full. Lilies in Bloom is dedicated to the memory of Katherine Beale.

Artistic Design Committee Chairman Tory Willis noted the Artistic Design Committee has been very busy with the flower and photography workshop, Symposium, and Daffodil Day over the last year. A special thank you was given to everyone who helped with revising the judging process and the revisions on modern designs. There will be no Symposium in 2020, but the Committee is planning to host workshops during that time frame. There will be an opportunity for each club to create an arrangement displayed during the Founders Day Celebration at the Virginia Museum of History and Culture featuring distinct periods. Each club is encouraged to participate.

Corresponding Secretary Janet Rosser thanked everyone for their generous donations to the Annual Fund. Janet then introduced the following Committee Chairmen for whom she serves as their Board Liaison prior to their reports. GCV Historian and Custodian of Records Judy Perry reminded everyone to write their two-year club history after their term as president and email them to Judy. Presidents may also bring them to the KVH to be placed in their club's box. Ann Heller will place them on the GCV website. The Humorous Memories Project continues, and the deadline for stories is June 1. Over 100 stories have been received, and please encourage your club members to continue to submit stories. Names will not be used, but include your name and club for contact information. Please send these to Judy at <u>gcvhistorian1920@gmail.com</u>. Judy then reported Architect Mr. Liam O'Connor who is designing the British Normandy Memorial that will be unveiled in 2020 had contacted her. Mr. O'Connor had noticed the plaque installed at a church listing the names of GCV husbands and sons that had been lost in WWII. The GCV had adopted the little war-torn town of Ver-sur-Mer, a commune in the Normandy region, and restored ten stained glass windows in a 12th-century church located there. The town honored the GCV by naming a street the "Rue de Garden Club of Virginia." Judy will be writing a Journal article about this. The story of GCV's involvement with Ver-sur-Mer can be found online as written in Follow the Green Arrow, Volume 1. Journal Editorial Board Chairman Julie Grover announced the Journal would be redesigned and the new format will be revealed in the June 2020 edition that will be devoted to the Centennial. The new Journal will feature more and larger photographs, more white space, and issues with themes such as floral designs, the environment, garden legacies, and travel. There will be more focus on member club projects, member gardens, and profiles on experts and organizations in GCV-related fields. Julie asked each GCV committee to appoint a Journal liaison and forward their name to her by June 1. Journal Advertising Chairman Lea Shuba asked members to reach out to her with leads for potential *Journal* advertisers. There are advertising packets available, and Lea noted there is more success with a local connection. Please remember to advertise club events and club items for sale in the Journal. Conservation and Beautification Chairman Carrie Dorsey introduced **Conservation Fellow Brynn Cook** who gave a very informative presentation on "Foraging Specialization in Polluted Atmospheres."

First Vice President and Chairman of the Centennial Steering Committee Missy Buckingham announced: "The Centennial merchandise is here!" Scarves, ties, bow ties, a Centennial Waterford ornament, and Tervis Tumblers were available for purchase at the meeting. The costs of the merchandise are as follows:

These items will be for sale during the Annual Meeting and will also be available at the KVH, GCV events, and on the GCV website soon excluding the Tervis Tumblers.

After a 20-minute break, the meeting resumed at 3:15 p.m.

Conservation Awards Chairman Heidi James thanked member clubs for submitting their ballots for the Bessie Bocock Carter Conservation Award. This award is supported through the generosity of the Carter family. Clubs receiving this award must implement a project that conserves resources and/or protects the environment, benefits a local community or the entire Commonwealth of Virginia, should serve as a catalyst for community action and inspire future conservations and conservation accomplishments. The 2019 winner of the Bessie Bocock Carter Award was announced as the Winchester-Clarke Garden Club for their Abrams Creek Wetlands Preserve project. President Barbara Bandyke accepted the \$7000 award.

Conservation and Beautification Chairman Carrie Dorsey reported the Committee has been very busy, and Legislation Day was very successful with a great turn out. The Committee reviewed the Governor's proposed budget which allocated funds for conservation and natural resource programs representing a historic increase this year. A bill was passed to require Coal Ash Clean Up at the four unlined coal ash ponds in Virginia. The GCV continues its affiliation with the Virginia Conservation Network and Virginia Forever, which are excellent resources. The Committee will write a letter to the EPA on behalf of the GCV supporting the protection of the highest standards of water quality and to maintain the integrity of the Clean Water Act.

Back to Nature - Horticulture, Hiking and Conservation Forum - Trees: Canopy of Conservation at Natural Bridge - Conservation and Beautification Chairman Carrie Dorsey reported The Conservation Forum Committee would be hosting the Conservation Forum in conjunction with the State Parks and Horticulture Committees as part of the Centennial Celebration on September 24 - 25, 2019, at Natural Bridge State Park. There will be four speakers on September 25 with the topic of "Trees: Canopy of Conservation.." The speakers include Frazier Armstong of Capital Trees, Elizabeth Brantly of Bartlett Trees, Eric Wiseman of Virginia Tech Big Tree Program, and Andrew Moore, author of Pawpaw: In Search of America's Forgotten Fruit. State Parks Chairman Nina Mustard presented the schedule of events. Monday, September 23 will be a set-up day. Tuesday, September 24 will include the Native Plants Horticulture Show, group and self-guided hikes, and geocaching. Bartlett Trees will have an event for children, and there will be a tree planting instead of a ribbon cutting. A Sip and See is scheduled from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Horticulture Chairman Wendy Walker encouraged members to bring blooms to the horticulture show and noted there is no advanced registration except for the Picnic in the Park exhibitors. The Picnic in the Park class requires individuals to bring a food item from their garden that will be judged. Please save green glass bottles for the horticulture display. The signup is available on the GCV website.

Horticulture Committee Chairman Wendy Walker thanked everyone for bringing the horticulture "Storm Survivors" display. Please inform the Horticulture Committee about what topics members want to read about in the *Journal*. Horticulture Field Day will be held May 22-23 and is sold out. The 2019 Horticulture Award of Merit winners are Susan Garrett, The Nansemond River Garden Club, and Sherry Leffel, The Spotswood Garden Club.

GCV Recoding Secretary Kris Carbone presented the Membership Committee report for Chairman Diane Wilkinson. The Three Rivers Garden Club has increased their membership to 25, and they helped The Ashland Garden Club with their 2019 HGW tour. Membership Orientation was held at Daffodil Day and was informative and interesting with the strong support of GCV chairmen and staff. The Membership Committee will request nominations for GCV honorary membership from member clubs in the near future.

Common Wealth Committee Chairman Karla MacKimmie reminded everyone the Common Wealth Award provides annual grants to the community projects of the GCV's member clubs. The Elizabeth River Garden Club was the 2018 recipient. The 2019 finalist will be written about in the *Journal* and voted on by the member clubs in the fall. The winner will be announced at the Board of Governors in October. Congratulations were given to the two finalists for the 2019 Common Wealth Award: Peter Paul Development Center and Playground Enhancement submitted by the Boxwood Garden Club, and The Discovery Trail: Connecting Children with Nature submitted by the Mill Mountain Garden Club.

Restoration Chairman Anne Baldwin reported each member of the Committee serves as a liaison to several of the Restoration properties. The Committee travels across the state several times per year to visit the properties on a rotating basis. Members of the Committee would love to visit each of the member clubs and give a 30 or 50-minute presentation. They can also visit and provide an update on Restoration and answer questions about the activities of the Committee. The GCV Restoration Research Fellowships were awarded. Dania Khlaifat, the Rudy J. Favretti Fellow, will be researching the historic landscape at Farmington Country Club in Charlottesville, VA. The William D. Rieley Fellow, Hayden Hammons, will be researching Mount Airy in Warsaw, VA. There will be special events planned at some Restoration properties in honor of the GCV Centennial with information to follow. Anne presented an opportunity for a special gift from the GCV to The British Normandy Memorial in honor of the 75th anniversary of D Day. The history of the GCV's support of war-torn Europe in WWII in the 1940s was presented. In 1940, a \$1000 gift was sent from Restoration funds to England in support of civilian relief. In 1941, \$20,000 was donated for relief in Britain, which was the entire proceeds of HGW for that year. \$20,000 is the equivalent of \$357,000 today. Lady Astor, the first woman elected to the British Parliament, facilitated these efforts. The Restoration Committee recommended the GCV send \$20,000 from Restoration funds to support landscaping at The British Normandy Memorial, and the GCV Board of Directors voted to support this. This gift will be listed as part of the Restoration budget under "Special Gifts and Contributions." Anne Baldwin made the following motion:

Motion: I move that the GCV send \$20,000 from the Restoration funds to support the British Normandy Memorial for the landscaping of the grounds of the Memorial. The motion carried unanimously.

Restoration Chairman Anne Baldwin introduced **GCV Landscape Architect Mr. Will Rieley**, who gave a presentation titled "A Short Look Back at What We have Done in Virginia."

President Gilpin reminded everyone the Annual Meeting will continue at 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday and adjourned the meeting at 4:16 p.m.

The Annual Meeting resumed at 9:01 a.m. on Wednesday with a call to order by President Gilpin.

President Gilpin began the morning by thanking The Elizabeth River Garden Club and congratulated Judy Perry for receiving the Massie Medal for Distinguished Achievement. President Gilpin also

congratulated Anne Beals for being the recipient of the deLacy Gray Memorial Medal for Conservation. **Recording Secretary Kris Carbone** presented the Roll Call Report: 7 Officers, 6 Directors at Large, 7 Board Committee Chairmen, 9 Standing Committee Chairmen, 4 Special Committee Chairmen, 4 GCV Staff members, 11 former GCV Presidents, 41 Presidents, 6 Vice Presidents, 44 Delegates, 4 Special Guests, and accounting for those attending in more than one capacity, the total number of attendees was 144.

President Gilpin announced Bartlett Tree Experts would be the main Centennial sponsor. Bartlett shares the same values as the GCV. Their support will include 12 in-kind support workdays, and they are hoping to focus their efforts on the GCV Restoration properties.

Development Committee Chairman Sue Rosser thanked the Centennial sponsors in addition to Bartlett Trees. These sponsors include Towne Bank, Hildrup and the McDaniel family, IMVA, Valley Protein, Robert and Lucy Huff, and Grelen Nursery. Sue presented "The top ten reasons of what the GCV does for me." Everyone was reminded of the elevator cards that were left for each attendee on the tables promoting the GCV's positive impact on Virginia.

GCV Executive Director Lynn McCashin proclaimed the ladies of the GCV have always had their own way of getting things done, are relentless, and have been able to grow with the sophistication of our knowledge! Great examples include fighting against billboards, the protection of the Goshen Pass, and the development of position papers. Lynn encouraged the attendees to carry on the GCV mission.

Kent-Valentine House Committee Chairman Jody Branch thanked Lynn McCashin, Quan McGough, and Lee Mondesir for keeping the KVH running smoothly. All current projects at the KVH will be finished by summer. There is new paint, a repaired roof, new carpet, new upholstery, refinished furniture, and soon the floors will be refinished. There are currently two pier mirrors that have been conserved, two that are in the process of being conserved, and one in the pipeline. The landscape will be attended to and ready for the fall. The dogwood planted in honor of Margaret Bemiss was filled with blooms, and the 'Green Arrow' daffodils bloomed out front. There will be a cocktail reception at the KVH on Tuesday, May 12, 2020, as part of the Centennial Celebration events. Jody reminded everyone to please bring members to visit the KVH.

The Directors at Large (Bettie Guthrie, Meg Laughon, Anne Harrison Harris, Debbie Lewis, Tuckie Westfall, and Ellen Upton) presented the accomplishments of the member clubs. The DALS reminded everyone that the 6 DALs are there to help the member club presidents. There will be a Presidents Day hosted on June 3, 2019, from 10:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. at the KVH. DALs Debbie Lewis, Ellen Upton, and Meg Laughon with the help of 2nd Vice President Catherine Madden sang the song "Red Roses," and each president was given a red rose. Tuckie Westfall, Meg Laughon, and Ellen Upton are ending their terms and were thanked for their service by President Gilpin.

First Vice President Missy Buckingham presented the Nominations Committee report for Chairman Ann Gordon Evans. The nominations for Directors at Large include:

District 2: Fran Carden-Albemarle Garden Club District 5: Laura Francis-The Hunting Creek Garden Club District 6: Debbie Bonnewell-Harborfront Garden Club

President Gilpin read Article VIII, Section 8.3 of the Garden Club of Virginia Bylaws which states: Nominations made by this committee do not preclude nominations from the floor, provided consent of the candidate has been obtained in advance. No nominations from the floor were presented. The May 2019 - May 2021 slate for the three Directors at Large was accepted as presented.

Chairman of Strategic Planning Candy Crosby communicated the Committee continues to focus on ways the GCV can embrace the next 100 years. The Committee has had nine meetings since 2018 and announced the issues and recommendations for the GCV Board of Directors. These include:

Ownership of HGW including the trademark and copyright of HGW HGW accounting – best practices provided for member clubs on how to handle HGW GCV Finance - create a five-year budget and hire a consultant to determine if our level of spending is sustainable for five years. GCV Communications – The GCV should consider establishing a Communications Committee to oversee the President's monthly newsletter, *The Year in Review*, the website, and social media. The Chairman would serve on the Board of Directors. GCV *Journal* – Explore the possibility of upgrading the design GCV Membership – Investigate whether new membership categories could be added GCV Nominating and Leadership – Create a simple electronic survey to identify potential leaders and talents of club members GCV Member Club Presidents – Club Presidents invite their respective Director at Large and the GCV President to attend one of their membership meetings during their term

Claire Mellinger, Albermarle Garden Club has been an integral part of GCV events by creating a photography class at Daffodil Day and the Symposium. Claire noted member photography is now included in the President's *Membership News*. The Symposium had six classes and 36 entries, and Daffodil Day had four classes and 16 entries. The Novice Award at the Daffodil Show was given to Patricia Sauer, Tuckahoe, and the Claire Smithers Mellinger Award was given to Catriona Erler, Albermarle. The photography workshop was a great time, and participants used their cell phone cameras. This workshop may be hosted again in 2020. In 2020, Claire will join forces with the Restoration Committee and create a photography show called "A Sense of Place." The schedule will be sent to all members. This will be a juried show displayed at the KVH.

2019 Annual Meeting Co-Chairman Shirley Sondej introduced guest speaker Captain M.K. Nunley, Nurse Corps, USN, Retired, who gave a presentation about activities on a US Navy aircraft carrier. Shirley then introduced Captain George W. Watkins, Retired, who shared pilot stories and facts about the Port of Virginia, including Virginia's imports and exports.

After a 23-minute break, the meeting resumed at 10:53 a.m.

Historic Garden Week Chairman Stephie Broadwater thanked everyone for all their time and energy to pull off HGW. Stephie visited seven tours and noted the beautiful weather. Because HGW concluded on May 4, no reports were currently available with results expected by mid-June. KISS or Keep it Simple Sisters was presented encouraging clubs to focus on what HGW is – a home and garden tour. Each club should take a fresh look at how tours are planned including the number of volunteers, the number of arrangements, and the number of houses. When planning a tour, the number of homes should be based on the available resources. The HGW State Committee is focused on social media and encouraged clubs to do the same. All but one tour has a Facebook page and all but two have an Instagram presence. Facebook followers have had an increase of 20%, and Instagram followers have increased by 42%. The state Instagram account is @historicgardenweek, and the local tours are

This year was the first ever mention of HGW by the *Wall Street Journal*. HGW was also seen in *Virginia* Living, Garden and Gun, Albermarle magazine and other publications. HGW has a continued relationship with *Flower Magazine*, and a writer from *Architectural Digest* attended. There will be a significant update to the Insiders Guide, which will include job descriptions of key roles. The best practices on tracking attendance include using a clicker at one or two of the homes, and every visitor should be counted, including state pass holders. The state HGW Committee has been working very hard over the last two years and have made two recommendations to the GCV Board. These include the tour change request process, and a change to the GCV bylaws of member clubs annual responsibilities associate with HGW. It is also the Committee's job to view HGW as a statewide event, not just single tours. HGW is going to be organized into geographic regions instead of the current districts. These regions include the east, west, north, south, and central regions. A handout was shared titled "Historic Garden Week by Day" showing a layout of how many tours are scheduled on each day. Tour proceeds can be affected by to much competition on a single day, bad weather, and gaps between regional tour days. If you would like to change your tour day, please contact the HGW State Chairman. An announcement was made that a new database project will be started to include tour histories, and this will occur in phases. In addition, there will be an update to the economic impact study that was completed in 2014. The photograph for the cover of the 2020 Guidebook has been taken, and it fits perfectly into the Centennial year. Stephie stated, "You are going to love it!" Stephie thanked Karen Ellsworth, Terri Lowman, Jean Gilpin, Lynn McCashin and the HGW State Committee for all their efforts during her time as HGW Chairman. Tricia Garner, Rappahannock Valley Garden Club, was introduced and will be the 2019 - 2021 HGW State Chairman. Tricia thanked Stephie for all that she has accomplished during the past two years.

Virginia State Parks Committee Chairman Nina Mustard reported the GCV is in year four of the fiveyear, \$500,000 funding commitment to the State Parks. A slide show was presented depicting the history, attendance, and spending at Virginia State Parks. Nina noted a total of 21 member clubs partnered with 23 State Parks, and 12 grants were given in 2019. Nina also shared slides of projects funded by the GCV Centennial State Park commitment. Everyone was encouraged to attend the event at Natural Bridge on September 24 - 25. President Gilpin noted Nina would be rotating off the Board as Past GCV President and thanked Nina for her 11 years of service to the GCV Board of Directors.

Annual and Board of Governors Meetings Chairman Sydney Jordan thanked members of The Elizabeth River Garden Club including Co-Chairmen Martha Perkins and Shirley Sondej for planning a wonderful Annual Meeting. **Susie Rawles, James River Garden Club**, thanked Elizabeth River and noted they had set the bar high. Susie read a poem and invited attendees to the 100th Annual Meeting in Richmond on May 12, 2020.

Annual Meeting Co-Chairmen Martha Perkins and Shirley Sondej thanked everyone for coming to Portsmouth. Martha Perkins stated she hoped everyone has made new friends and enjoyed learning about Portsmouth.

President Gilpin thanked the GCV Board of Directors, Committee Chairmen, and club presidents and commented that they inspire us all. President Gilpin also thanked The Elizabeth River Garden Club for all their efforts in making this a wonderful meeting.

With no new business being brought forth, the meeting was adjourned at 11:35 a.m.

Today, we, the 3,500 members of the Garden Club of Virginia, not only carry on the traditions and aspirations of our past, but we continue to build on these goals and beliefs. We have become stronger, more dedicated, and more impassioned as we carry out our mission to conserve, preserve and beautify our Commonwealth while educating and encouraging future generations to do the same.

Today marks the beginning of our year of Centennial celebration. Today, you will hear from committee chairmen about how their committees will celebrate our past while reaching out to the future. I invite you to join us as we celebrate all that we are. And I thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve you and the Garden Club of Virginia.

To start the celebration, I would like to recognize a very special group of women. These ladies have been steadfast in their loyalty to GCV. They are our pillars, our ambassadors, truly the shoulders upon which this organization stands. We would not be here today without their efforts, hard work and support. So, I ask our Former Presidents of the Garden Club of Virginia, to please stand and accept, with our gratitude and respect, a gift we have for you to mark the beginning of our Centennial Year.

An article detailing the 2019 finalists' projects will appear on the website and in the June issue of the *Journal*. Member clubs will vote on the project prior to the Board of Governors meeting in October, at which time the winner will be announced.

Congratulations to the two finalists for the 2019 Common Wealth Award: Peter Paul Development Center and Playground Enhancement submitted by the Boxwood Garden Club and The Discovery Trail: Connecting Children with Nature submitted by Mill Mountain Garden Club.

Conservation and Beautification Committee

Thank you to all of the Elizabeth River Garden Club – your gracious hospitality has made us all feel so welcome!

Legislative Day: The Conservation and Beautification Committee continues to be busy! We had a hugely successful Legislative Day back in January with the Virginia Conservation Network putting together a line-up of state officials and conservation directors to speak with us on some of the most pressing environmental policies facing Virginia. GCV had a good turnout of club members who gathered in Richmond to visit their legislators and advocate for the Garden Club's issues of concern.

As many of you know, the Governor's proposed budget allocated for conservation and natural resource programs represented a historic increase this year! The VA General Assembly focused much of its spending on water quality programs. Several outstanding accomplishments included the bills passed to require **Coal Ash Clean Up** at the 4 unlined coal ash ponds in Virginia. At least 1/4 of the coal ash collected will be recycled and the remainder will be removed safely to contained areas away from any watershed. **Agriculture Best Management Practice programs** were the big winner in terms of funding. Those programs will allow farmers and rural residents more money to invest in tree planting and fencing which will reduce polluted water runoff into streams and rivers. In tangent with water quality improvement, Alexandria water treatment facilities received the money they needed to bring their facilities up to the highest standards and reduce runoff into the Potomac and Chesapeake Bay. These are just a few of the General Assembly's bipartisan accomplishments.

GCV's affiliations with Virginia Conservation Network and Virginia Forever organizations have proved to be excellent partnerships and resources to help us understand the complex conservation issues **and** corresponding budget appropriations. Additionally, these partnerships expand our contacts at the state association level with whom we can build relationships and continue to learn from. It's nice to be able to call up people at the Department of Forestry or Department of Environmental Quality and learn how specific funding may affect their success.

GCV also follows national level issues – especially when they are complicated and affect Virginia directly. This year's hot topic was the proposed changes to the Clean Water Rule of 2015. It is still in play... After much research, it was agreed that the issue was best addressed by GCV crafting our own letter of support rather than sign onto a group letter of other environmental organizations. This letter to the Environmental Protection Agency outlined

GCV's mission of protecting **the highest** standards of water quality and asked the federal government not to jeopardize the integrity of the original Clean Water Act. I am expecting a response back from Andrew Wheeler of the EPA!

Onto our Fall Activities: The Conservation Forum committee is excited to announce this Fall's Conservation Forum in conjunction with the Parks and Horticulture Committees as part of our big Centennial Celebration on **September 24 and 25th at Natural Bridge State Park!** The topic is **Trees: Canopy of Conservation**. Four **excellent** speakers will present on Wednesday as well as a guided hike offered that afternoon outside of the Lexington Horse Center which will focus on the unique topography of the area around the river in addition to the trees that thrive there. It will be an athletic hike from what I am told.

The Wednesday speakers will revolve around the health of our forests and trees, and their various ecosystems. We have engaged the **head** of Virginia Tech's Forestry Program, Eric Weisman, who also sits on the board of Trees Virginia. He will speak about the Big Tree Program along with diseases and pests challenging trees in VA. The executive director of Capital Trees in Richmond will showcase all that has been accomplished by their organization to transform a once desolate area of inner-city Richmond into a beautifully landscaped park that is now a destination for urban residents and tourists alike. Their process of collaborating with the city has become a formula for other organizations to achieve public/ private partnerships in cities across Virginia. Focusing on Tree health will be an expert from Bartlett Trees who will show us the symbiotic relationship of trees and other plants and how that effects other ecosystems. Our show case speaker is a renowned author whose book on the forgotten Paw Paw Tree will speak about fruit trees and their beneficial relationship to other plants. **Who knew** that the Paw Paw fruit is North America's **largest** edible fruit? I am looking forward to learning more...perhaps tasting a sample... and hope **you all** will join us at Natural Bridge for this multi program, **super interesting** conservation forum and centennial celebration this September!

Bessie Bocock Carter Conservation Award Winner for 2019 Winchester-Clarke Garden Club Abrams Creek Wetlands Preserve

This award, named for the GCV President from 1998-2000, was established in 2009 and is a monetary award that is funded through the GCV with the generous support of the Carter family. Clubs receiving this award must implement a project that conserves resources and/or protects the environment, benefits a local community or the entire Commonwealth of Virginia, should serve as a catalyst for community action and inspire future conservationists and conservation accomplishments.

This year's winning project is the Abrams Creek Wetlands Preserve, sponsored by the Winchester-Clarke Garden Club. Barbara Bandyke is their President and would she please come forward! The Winchester Clarke Garden Club, in partnership with the City of Winchester's Parks and Recreation Department and Shenandoah University's Environmental Studies Program, began supporting the project in 2003.

With a central location, this 25-acre urban greenspace and wetlands preserve is an educational and recreational resource for Winchester. In 2017, recognizing the fragility of the marsh, the WCGC began raising funds and donating volunteer hours to restore and protect it. The marsh is a habitat for over 304 plant species, including 20 that are rare in Virginia and 2 that are found nowhere else in the state. No other comparable wetlands in Virginia has as many rare plant species.

Because the marsh is also a calcareous muck fen with a limestone bedrock, low acidity and high nutrient levels, it captures pollutants and keeps them out of drinking water. It can take 10,000 years for a fen to develop and it would be terrible to lose it. Encroaching shrubs and trees threatened the area, as does nearby development.

WCGC members will add signage, handicap accessible paths, an audio walking tour, and manpower to help keep the marsh free of invading plant life. Because of the efforts of the WCGC, the City of Winchester and Shenandoah University, the Abrams Creek Wetlands Preserve is a protected haven for learning, relaxing and appreciating the gifts of nature.

Congratulations to the Winchester Clarke Garden Club. This year's award amount is \$7,000 and we know they will put it to great use!

Presentation of deLacy Gray Medal for Conservation

It's not often that one has the honor of recognizing someone who has dedicated her life to a worthy cause that benefits every single one of us. I have just such an honor tonight as I introduce this year's winner of the deLacy Gray Conservation Medal. First awarded in 1965 as a memorial to de Lacy Thompson Gray and given originally by the Dolley Madison Garden Club, this medal is presented to an individual member, or a member club, for outstanding effort to further the knowledge of our natural resources and to encourage their wise use. This year's winner is Anne Mead Beals, who was nominated by Jeanette Cadwallender. Anne has worked throughout her life to promote responsible forestry and the ideals of conservation. Beginning in 1973, Anne and her late husband, George, lived on 3,800-acre Oakley Farm in Spotsylvania County and managed it using responsible farming and forestry practices. Because of their efforts, Oakley Farm was designated as a Tree Farm in 1988, earned recognition from the National Endowment for Soil and Water Conservation in 1990, won the Clean Water Farm Award in 1999, and was recognized as a Good Earth Conservation Farm.

Anne has also been a great educator. Over the years, 4th graders in Spotsylvania County had the opportunity to come to Oakley Farm for a program called the Meaningful Watershed

Educational Experience, through a partnership between the Tri-County Soil & Water Conservation District, Virginia Tech and the local public school system.

In 2017, the Beals family sold 2,900 acres of Oakley Farm to the Commonwealth of Virginia. The Department of Game and Inland Fisheries now oversees it as the Oakley Forest Wildlife Management Area. It will be managed in perpetuity as working forest land. The remaining 900 acres, including two historic homes, will remain in the family and will be protected by a conservation easement. By putting 2,900 acres of Oakley Farm in perpetual managed care, the Beals family has preserved open space, protected a fragile wildlife habitat and conserved natural resources.

Anne has served on the GCV Conservation and Beautification Committee several times and was chairman from 2012-14. She was on the committee when the GCV, in partnership with the National Wildlife Foundation, created a PowerPoint presentation on Climate Change. Anne traveled to member clubs to share the presentation. This work led to the GCV adopting a position on climate change. Anne has written numerous articles for the GCV *Journal*, including one on the GCV's position on uranium mining.

In the 35 years of membership in the Rappahannock Valley Garden Club, including serving as President from 2004-2006, Anne has led club conservation projects on best practices for water conservation, urban forestry, recycling and smart growth.

Anne has served on numerous boards over the years including the Virginia Conservation Network, the Virginia Forestry Board, she served as Chairman of the Editorial Committee of Virginia Forests Magazine, and the list goes on and on. We can all appreciate Anne's efforts by hearing this list, but we know it is only the tip of the iceberg of what else she has done behind the scenes. With much enthusiasm I present to you

The Annual Fund is so important to all of the work we do. Our Centennial goal is giving 100% for 100 years. We are hopeful that you will WANT to give, that you experience the joy of giving and share it with your club. It is contagious!!! Thank you for all you do to support GCV.

GCV Treasurer's Budget Presentation

Madame President and Ladies,

I am delighted to present to you as your GCV Treasurer. My report will be in two parts today. In the first part, I will update you on where we are in this current fiscal year. In the second part, we will turn our attention to the proposed GCV budget for the next fiscal year.

At its meeting yesterday, your Board of Directors approved my request to present you with a summarized Treasurer's Report.

Our GCV fiscal year began on July 1, 2018 and will end on June 30, 2019. I am reporting to you today through the end of April 2019. I will be writing a report summarizing the entire fiscal year and you will be able to find this included in the upcoming publication of the "Year in Review" for 2018-2019.

The GCV currently maintains two interest-bearing accounts with Union Bank in Richmond, an operating account and a money market account. The total of the Union accounts as of April 30 was \$380,639.

In addition, the GCV has Endowment and restricted funds that are managed and invested by Investment Management of Virginia—a large-cap stock account and a small-cap stock account. The total on our accounts managed by IMVA as of April 30 was \$5,419,674. Darrell and King in Charlottesville manages and invests funds for current and future GCV Restoration projects. The value of this account as of April 30 was \$1,671,920. These cash and investment accounts represent about 85% of our assets. The remaining 15% of our assets are the Kent-Valentine House and its contents and collections.

Our current liabilities include accounts payable, the Centennial Va. State Parks project commitment funds, and any security deposits held for upcoming events at KVH; a total of \$10,114 on 4/30/19.

At this point, we are in a great position to end our fiscal year. You will hear more about year-end revenue as HGW and Development present their reports.

Budget:

Now we will focus our attention on the proposed GCV Operating Budget for the upcoming fiscal that begins on July 1, 2019 and extends through June 30, 2020. At our meeting

yesterday, the GCV Board of Directors reviewed and approved the complete 13-page GCV annual budget. The Board approved a motion to present to you the summarized version of that budget for your review and vote.

In order to prepare this budget, our bookkeeper sends out budget information requests to each officer and committee chair as well as administrative staff in February. Members of the Finance Committee then meet with each of the committee chairs to assist them in preparing budget requests. The information is then compiled to produce the proposed GCV Operating Budget.

This proposed budget then goes through a thorough review process. First, the GCV Executive Director, GCV Finance Committee chair, GCV Treasurer and GCV Bookkeeper review all information and compare it to historical budget data. The budget is then reviewed and approved by the Executive Committee, the Finance Committee, and finally by the GCV Board of Directors at their meeting yesterday. In a few minutes, I will request your vote of approval. Each of you should have a copy of the summarized budget before you. If you would like to follow along, I will review it by category. We will start with 2019-2020 Funding. The GCV Operating Fund is dependent upon four funding sources—Membership dues, the Annual Fund, a draw from the Endowment Fund, and any special fundraisers or draws from restricted funds. The GCV "forward funds" our operating expenses—in other words, we budget based on actual funds received the year before. We carry forward from the previous fiscal year the Membership Dues collected in March of 2019, the monies we collect from the 2018-2019 Annual Fund through June 30, and the budgeted amount we expect to receive from the 2019 Historic Garden Week.

You will note that the dues income shows little change from year to year as dues have remained at \$40 per member since 2008.

In addition, the Finance Committee and Board approved a draw of up to 4.5% from the Endowment fund to provide the additional funds needed to produce a balanced budget. The Board of Directors is authorized to approve up to a 5% draw but felt that a 4.5% maximum draw will meet our needs for the coming year.

There are a few other line items under funding: the Symposium Fund Draw is a 4% draw on the Williams Symposium Fund for the Centennial speakers; there is a House Fund draw of 4%; the KVH Capital Improvement category includes restricted gifts to provide special repairs and restoration to the Kent-Valentine House and includes funding to restore our museum-quality mirrors; the 2018-2019 Centennial Budget Funding includes monies collected in the current fiscal year that will carry forward to the new budget year. The proceeds from Historic Garden Week are used to fund restoration projects and our 5th and final Centennial gift to Virginia State Parks. This figure is based on a budgeted amount and not the actual as we have not received the final figures. Last, is the Restoration transfer of funds representing funds from the Darrell & King investment accounts that will be used to fund Restoration Projects in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. **Our total Funding is \$1,398,842.**

Projected Revenue includes HGW Admissions and Guidebook income; Donation income which includes donations to the 2019-2020 Annual Fund, to the Bessie Carter memorial fund, the Common Wealth Award Fund, the Conservation and Endowment funds and restricted gifts, such as donations to the KVH Mirror Restoration fund; Membership dues to be collected in March 2020; Meeting and Event income, includes GCV and KVH events; Income from GCV publications; Carriage House rental funds and Sponsorships. The Other Income category includes \$50,000 in Centennial sponsorships and donations, \$10,000 in Centennial Daffodil bulb sales, \$51,120 in Centennial merchandise sales and \$86,000 in Centennial event registrations. **Total projected Revenue is \$1,305,761.**

Let's take a look at **Projected Expenses**. We'll start with Staff Compensation and Staff Travel and Development. This compensation was reviewed and approved by the Executive Committee and Board according to our Employee Handbook guidelines. Category 5200 is Historic Garden Week expenses. You will note that Category 5400 Restoration expenses are high and continue to reflect our work being done this year at several major historic sites. Category 5600, GCV Other Events, includes Conservation Forum, Artistic Design Workshops, Daffodil Day, and Horticulture Field Day. Category 5800 (Other Expenses) includes the Common Wealth award, the Conservation and Environmental Studies Fellowship, the Centennial, the State Parks Project commitment, and financial support to the host clubs for Annual Meeting and Board of Governors meeting. Postage and equipment leases come under this category.

Total Program Expenses are \$1,844,979.

Management and General Expenses, our next category, covers maintenance and operation of the Kent Valentine House, 6200 is administrative costs. Category 6300 Communications includes funding for printing of the "Year in Review.", website expenses and phones. In Category 6700, Computers, includes software and a scheduled replacement of some of our older computers. The total for Management and General Expense is \$217,144. Total Projected Expense is \$2,083,108.

At the bottom of the page, 2020-2021 Funding reflects the funds that will leave this fiscal year's operating account at the end of the year to forward fund the next fiscal year. When you add our Total Funding and Projected Revenue minus our Total Projected Expenses, you will see that we will have enough funding to cover our anticipated expenses and will be able to forward fund for 2020-2021. While this budget shows a net Cash Flow of -\$7,705, we have recently received Centennial donations to cover the shortfall that are not shown in this budget. So, at this time, we have a positive Cash Flow for the upcoming budget. I have complete copies of the budget with me throughout this meeting and will be happy to discuss any questions that you may have. Please call on me or Tricia McDaniel, our Finance chair, at any time.

MOTION: Madame President, I move that the GCV vote to approve the budget as presented for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2019 and ending on June 30, 2020.

Finance Committee

Tricia McDaniel, Chairman

The Finance Committee oversees all Garden Club of Virginia finances including the annual GCV budget, financial investments, insurance matters and the annual audit of accounts.

The Finance Committee worked with the GCV Treasurer to prepare and review the 2019-20 budget. Finance Committee members consulted with GCV committee chairmen and GCV staff to prepare their individual proposed budgets which were then consolidated into the larger budget. Review committees strove to accommodate as many budget requests as possible while achieving a balanced budget.

The Garden Club of Virginia has investment funds that are managed and invested by two investment firms: Investment Management of Virginia, located in Richmond, and Darrell & King, located in Charlottesville. Oversight of these investments is one of our committee responsibilities. Members of the Finance Committee receive quarterly reports from both firms and conduct annual reviews as to the managers' return relative to objectives and investment risk assumed. The GCV has an investment policy that both investment firms follow in investing our funds. The committee just completed its annual review with IMVA at our April meeting.

The GCV Endowment Fund, the GCV Conservation Fund and the Common Wealth Award Fund are included in the Investment Management of Virginia accounts. The monies in these three funds are pooled for investment purposes along with two restricted donations. The two restricted funds are a Symposium Fund and a Kent-Valentine House Fund.

Darrell and King, LLC manage the funds for GCV Restoration projects. The funds in this account are the net proceeds (minus the Virginia State Parks commitment) from Historic Garden Week, in addition to restoration donations, and are invested for use on current and future Restoration projects.

The current fund descriptions and their intended purposes can be found in the GCV Directory.

GCV has completed the first quarter of our fiscal year and our account balances and returns are:

- As of March 31, 2019, the *GCV Endowment Fund* invested with IMVA totaled \$5,340,330. The time weighted return for 2019 Q1 for the total combined account at IMVA was 9.26% vs. a Balanced Index (70/30) of 9.95%.
- As of March 31, 2019, the *GCV Restoration Fund* invested with Darrell and King totaled \$1,798,674. The time weighted return for the account at the end of 2019 Q1 was 8.0% vs. a Balanced Index (70/30) of 9.952%.

These returns are net of brokerage fees.

The Finance Committee decided to contribute a copy of our current budget (2019-20) and a current investment report reflecting our funds and their balances to the Centennial Time Capsule.

Historic Garden Week Committee

Historic Garden Week for 2019 has just wrapped, literally, just 4 days ago. I want to say "thank you" to everyone who had a hand in accomplishing this feat, again. This would include tour chairs, club members, homeowners, sponsors, advertisers, the HGW office and the GCV staff. I know everyone worked hard and, I hope, had fun along the way.

With HGW so recently concluded, tours have not had time to complete and report results yet. So, I do not currently have numbers to share with you. Reports are due by May 31, and we expect to compile and finalize the results by mid-June, at the latest. Tour chairs, Club Presidents and the GCV Board will receive a letter outlining statewide results and individual tour financials.

Under the Garden Club of Virginia umbrella, 31 tours were held, and 251 homes and gardens were open for visitors to explore and enjoy. It takes all of us coming together to support the mission of GCV for Historic Garden Week to be a success. Eight-six (86) times we have done this, starting in 1929 when HGW began because GCV was asked to help landscape Kenmore, the home of George Washington's sister. After successfully raising \$7,000 from a flower show to help save some of Thomas Jefferson's old trees at Monticello in 1927, the ladies felt confident they could help. So, they planned an 11-day tour and wrote notes inviting friends near and far to come to Virginia for a "pilgrimage" of historic houses and gardens. Little could they imagine then, that other GCV ladies following them would carry on what they started for so many years. HGW is quite a tradition that we, and our visitors, have loved, enjoyed and respected.

Restoration and preservation were, and still are, at the heart of our GCV mission. Think how different Virginia might look without the funds raised from HGW going into our restoration projects, our research fellowships for graduate students in landscape architecture, and most recently our grants to Virginia State Parks, our Centennial gift to our state. Our collective commitment and dedication make all this possible.

The HGW staff and State Committee were hard at work supporting HGW. Waverley Hill was chosen for the cover of the Guidebook along with the Virginia Bluebell being chosen as the flower. The Insider's Guide received a huge update this past spring. At Boot Camp, tours were encouraged to "Keep It Simple Sistas" and focus on the home and garden aspect of HGW. The Guidebook and marketing materials were designed, and pitches to multitudes of media outlets were made, quite successfully. We recommended to the GCV Board, and they approved, a Bylaws change and a Tour Change Request process that strengthen the foundation of HGW. Social media grew again this year, thanks to planning and great execution. We simplified the method of tracking attendance. Meetings were held, questions were answered, and possible disasters averted. Much was accomplished in support of the local tours.

There is no other event quite like Historic Garden Week. As we look toward our 87th HGW and the GCV Centennial, it's the perfect time to reflect on our past, enjoy the present and imagine what's possible in the future.

Historian and Custodian of Records

Madam President, Board of Directors and Ladies of the Club:

Yearbooks and club histories were received at the 2018 Board of Governors' Meeting and placed in the individual club's boxes at the Kent-Valentine House. A letter has gone out to the Club Presidents and Historians to bring their end-of-year reports and yearbooks to the Annual Meeting.

The Humorous Memories Project deadline for submissions was extended to June 1, 2019. More stories have come as a result and a final push to encourage continued participation is ongoing in this final month.

Story recruiting efforts consisted of speaking to the Centennial Liaison Committee on November 7, supplying forms for submission to that committee on April 2, an article in the January President's newsletter and an article in the March 2019 Journal. Forms will be available to each member attending this Annual Meeting. We have over 100 humorous stories at this time that will provoke a chuckle or side-splitting laughter and connect us all through this lighter side of GCV Centennial memories.

Because of my duties as historian, an inquiry from a gentleman from Great Britain was directed to me. It was Liam O'Conner, an architect in London, who had discovered a plaque in the 12th Church of St. Martin in Ver Sur Mer, in the Normandy area France that was in memory of the husbands and sons of members of the Garden Club of Virginia who died in WWII. Mr. O'Conner is working on a British Normandy Memorial that will be installed at Gold Beach in memory of the British who died on there during the D-Day Invasion. Before speaking with him, I went directly online to the GCV website to read the *Follow the Green Arrow Vol I* and looked in the sections of late 1930's and into the 1940's. The history of the GCV war relief efforts were in those pages. It is an amazing story of compassion and commitment of the ladies of the clubs through the raising of funds, the collection of goods, and acts of kindness that touched the lives of citizens in Britain and in Ver Sur Mer. Mr. O'Connor and the Normandy Memorial Trust made a request to the Restoration Committee for assistance with their memorial landscape. It is fascinating to read about the history of the GCV in both volumes of *Follow the Green Arrow* and in copies of the *Garden Gossip*, precursor to the *Journal*. The 2018 GCV Lily Collection of 6 bulbs was provided by B&D Lilies for \$32. The Harborfront GC offered to donate a perpetual trophy to the annual GCV Lily Show in memory of their member, Katherine Beale. The members of the GCV Lily Committee approved the offer, approved the renaming of the award for best Longiflorum/ Oriental Hybrid Lily from the "Lily Committee Award" to the "Katherine Beale Award" or wording chosen by Harborfront GC, and approved a motion to substitute the new trophy for the current cup trophy for that award. Harborfront responded with purchase of a lovely sterling bowl and offer to engrave the bowl. The Lily Committee voted to accept the trophy and wording for engraving. I have passed along that information to the Artistic Committee and to Harborfront GC. Harborfront will now engrave the trophy and present it to the GCV at the May annual meeting. I have had the pleasure of working with Harborfront GC President Debbie Bonnewell on this project.


Tribute information for Lily Award archives:

Nina Mustard is the Show Chairman, and I will assist her as horticulture chairman. Judges are GCV members accredited by the North American Lily Society. Her many activities within her community, and especially in conjunction with her club's Common Wealth Award winning project, Paradise Creek Nature Park, has earned her admiration, among her club members, and throughout the City of Portsmouth.

This year's recipient, Elizabeth River Garden Club's own Judy Boyd Perry believes that everyone has a gift to share, and her ability to be a confidence builder to encourage others to lead and contribute makes her the most worthy recipient of this highest honor bestowed on a GCV member.

Restoration Committee

Good afternoon Madame President, Ladies, and Gentlemen,

This has been an exciting year to be serving in the position of Chairman of the Restoration Committee, and I am grateful to Jean for giving me this opportunity.

As we kick off a year of celebrating our 100 years, I have asked our landscape architect, Will Rieley, to include in his presentation today a short look back at what we have done together across Virginia. We began raising funds with a garden tour in 1929 to restore the gardens at Kenmore in Fredericksburg. Our signature Historic Garden Week was created and a Restoration Committee was formed in 1934, as the Garden Club of Virginia made a commitment to restore and preserve public gardens and landscapes throughout our Commonwealth. Now each member of the committee serves as a liaison to several of our restored historic gardens. The committee also travels across the state several times a year to visit the properties on a rotating basis. We wish all 3,300 + members of the GCV could travel with us to share in the excitement and pride of what we have accomplished together. Since that is not possible, we are committed to keeping you informed about the projects and how the funds we raise together are being used. Hopefully you are reading Jean's monthly newsletter, which usually includes an update on our work. We have articles on restoration news that appear in our "Journal" each quarter, and our e-mail newsletter for our properties is available now to our GCV membership. However, one of the best ways we can communicate our excitement to you is for each club to invite us to come to one of your meetings. Our committee members would love to give the program for your club, and we are excited that we now have two programs with beautiful photos of our projects: a new 30minute version and the more complete 50-minute version to share with you and your club members. Or, we would be delighted to give an update and answer any questions.

In addition to the projects we have, the funds raised from Historic Garden Week also support two summer fellowships. Two graduate students with an interest in historic landscape architecture are chosen by a separate committee each year. This committee has been chaired by Judy Perry, a member of our hostess club, GCV Historian, and also a member of the Restoration Committee. Please read her complete report, but I am pleased to tell you that Dania Khaifat will be the Rudy J. Favretti Fellow and she will be researching the historic landscape at Farmington Country Club, and Hayden Hammons will be our William D. Rieley Fellow and he will be doing research at Mount Airy.

During this Centennial celebration year, we plan to offer some special events for our members, family, and friends at a number of our properties, and news will follow about these. Claire Mellinger and her photography committee also have planned an exciting opportunity to visit our restoration sites and photograph them. Claire is coming tomorrow to share this with you...so more about that then. The Restoration Committee also is designing a unique gift that we would like to give to the member of each of your clubs who visits the most restoration properties in this celebration year. I plan to be at the June President's meeting with more details on this.

Judy Perry has already introduced to you today a unique funding opportunity with the British Normandy Memorial that the Restoration Committee and the Board have looked at and approved. This will be listed under our "Special Gifts and Contributions". In 1940, a \$1000 gift was sent from Restoration funds to England to support civilian relief. The following year, the entire proceeds of the funds raised during HGW were donated to relief in Britain. This was \$20,000 in 1941 dollars or the equivalent of \$357,000 today. Our efforts were facilitated by our own Virginian, Lady Astor, who became the first woman Member of Parliament. The members of the GCV continued other efforts throughout the war. We have been asked to participate in a British Normandy Memorial, and the foundation for this will be laid on June 6, the 75th anniversary of D-Day. The Restoration Committee recommended and your Board voted to send \$20,000 from our Restoration funds to assist with the landscaping here. This gift comes in our Centennial celebration year and is a wonderful opportunity to honor the efforts of our GCV members during WW II.

I am bringing a motion from the Restoration Committee that has been approved by the Board of Directors at its meeting yesterday.

Motion: I move that the GCV send \$20,000 from the Restoration funds to support the British Normandy Memorial for the landscaping of the grounds of the Memorial.

Finally, it is my pleasure to introduce our GCV Landscape Architect of almost 21 years, Will Rieley. For those of you who have not had the opportunity to hear him speak, I would like to offer a brief introduction. William D. Rieley is the founding principal of Rieley & Assoc. in Charlottesville. He taught at UVA for over 20 years and served on the Albemarle County Planning Commission. I have said this before and I will continue to say this...we value his scholarship, his knowledge of plants is amazing, his attention to detail is so critical to the success of our projects. I am delighted that Will is here today to give you an update on our exciting projects.

Strategic Planning Committee

Candy Crosby, Chairman

Strategic Planning Committee continues its focus on ways to have GCV poised to embrace another 100 years of dynamic leadership in the Commonwealth of Virginia. We have had nine meetings since May 2018, mostly committee work and some smaller meetings. Heidi James of The Lynchburg GC takes the minutes.

Our discussions have resulted in several recommendations to the GCV Board. Please note it is up to the Board to decide whether and/or how to pursue any of these recommendations.

- Ownership of Historic Garden Week- The committee recommends that the trademark and copyright of HGW be secured to protect the Garden Club of Virginia's sole right to this name.
- HGW accounting- The committee recommends that the GCV Finance Committee provide guidance on best practices for member clubs on how to handle accounting for HGW. A "boot camp" for HGW treasurers would be helpful.
- GCV Finance- The committee supports the creation of a five-year projected budget and endorses the hiring of an outside financial consultant to determine if our current level of spending is sustainable for five years.
- GCV Communication- The committee recommends that the GCV establish a Communications Committee to be composed of GCV club members. It would oversee the monthly Enews, *The Year in Review*, the website and the social media. The chairman of the committee would serve on the Board of Directors.
- GCV *Journal* The committee recommends that the GCV explore the possibility of upgrading the design of the GCV quarterly magazine.
- GCV Membership- The committee recommends that the GCV investigate whether new membership categories could be added. This could be studied by the Development Committee and the Membership Committee.
- GCV Nominating and Leadership- The committee recommends that a simple electronic survey be created to identify potential leaders and the talents of club members.
- GCV Member Club Presidents- The committee recommends that member club presidents invite their respective Director at Large and the GCV President to attend one of their membership meetings during their term as president.

These recommendations are offered by the Strategic Planning Committee in a spirit of good will and with respect and thanks to the leadership of the GCV and GCV members.


