

In that time, the GCV has contributed more than \$17 million to the enhancement of the commonwealth. We have helped protect Goshen Pass, restored portions of the Great Dismal Swamp, protected and beautified natural landscapes along Virginia's highways, and completed nearly fifty major restorations including landscapes and gardens at Monticello, Mount Vernon, and Poplar Forest all open to the public. This work has been funded primarily by operating the oldest and largest statewidehouse and garden tour in the nation, Historic Garden Week (HGW).
