Fran Boninti

Born on the eastern end of the north fork of Long Island, a fishing and farming community, Fran grew up on a potato/brussel sprout farm. She was immersed in gardening because both sets of grandparents as well as her parents were rabid gardeners. She first learned the names of many weeds and plants in Croatian from her grandmother, Frances. She has lived in Charlottesville for forty years and has always had a garden. She has lived in the same house for thirty four years in the only house her daughters have ever known. She has three acres, two of which are surrounded by deer fencing, while the other acre is the wilder garden with trees and ferns that deer don't eat. She and her husband have done all their gardens, including design, planting and maintenance, themselves, except for the front lawn, which was removed two years ago. They have planted every tree, shrub and herbaceous plant themselves. They recently hired people to mulch the trails and they use an arborist. They have always had a special place for native plants. Fran is a charter member of the Jefferson Chapter of the Virginia Native Plant Society. She is also a member of the Monticello Bird Club and the Rivanna Garden Club. She is the Garden Club of Virginia state Horticulture Committee Chairman Emeritus, having served on the committee for eight years. She has been a master gardener since 1991 and has the most volunteer hours in the state. She was a garden guide for Monticello for seventeen years and did special tours every year including bird, wildflower, fern and natural history walks. She is an active member in many different horticulture organizations. She hosts tours through her property every spring. She has been married to Andrew (the saint!) for forty years, and they have two grown daughters whom they consider to be the greatest achievement of their lives and the most precious flowers in their garden.

Cathy Coyle

Cathy is owner of Willow Branch Flowers and Garden Design and teaches mechanics. Cathy has over 30 years experience in floral design, with a fine arts degree from the Corcoran School of Art as well as studies in horticulture and design for landscapes and gardens.

Keith Dix, Ph.D.

Keith owns and operates a certified organic farm in Ashland County on which he grows vegetables and grazes registered Jersey replacement heifers. She is a very popular guest on local and national radio and TV talk shows, including NPR and CBS. She was the Co-host of the Chicken Whisperer Talk Show. She is a popular workshop presenter and the creator of the Chickens and YOU training series leading to the Master Backyard Chicken Keeper Certification. She is the Founding President of the Gossamer Foundation, a nonprofit dedicated to global sustainability and local foods. As Pat says: "We can't have one without the other".

Claudia currently has a catering business in Nelson County and works out of a commercial kitchen in the Rockfish Community Center, which she has rented for the past 9 years. Her menus have been inspired by earlier years living abroad in the Middle East, Europe and Mexico.
