"Where flowers bloom, so does hope."

To me... beautification means our total concern for the physical and human quality we pass on to our children and the future."

Lady Bird Johnson is well-known for her advocacy for the environment. Her love of wildflowers has inspired their planting along highways across America. She was instrumental in the Highway Beautification Act of 1966 – legislation which has played an important role in the history of the Garden Club of Virginia.

Aster Symphyotrichum

A wildflower native to Virginia, the star-shaped aster means love and patience. It grows along highways up and down the northeast, and is beneficial as a pollinator for bees. There are 32 species of aster native to the commonwealth. he Garden Club of Virginia has been a voice for environmental education, conservation and preservation for nearly 100 years, but our hard work is not complete. Just as early GCV members took on highway beautification, we forge ahead today to challenge the environmental concerns that threaten the preservation of our landscape.
