Perhaps Mount Sharon's crowning glory is its setting, with panoramic view of the Blue Ridge Mountains and the coastal plain, its numerous 250-year-old tulip poplar trees, and its ten+ acres of gardens of national and international renown. The gardens, created by the present owners with highly-respected landscape architect Charles J. Stick, feature numerous fountains, pergolas, gazebo, pavilions, and garden statuary, as well as

formal and informal gardens inspired by the great gardens of England, France, and Italy. The gardens have been featured in more than a dozen magazines, newspapers, and books, and have been visited by horticultural, conservation, and preservation groups from throughout the world. ### Container Garden Building with Farley



**1-3:30 p.m.** ~ Guided tours of the spectacular **Annie duPont formal garden at Montpelier** will be conducted on the half hour.

In the early 19th century, President James Madison enjoyed a garden of nearly four acres, including the two-acre formal garden thought to be designed by French gardener, Bizet. In 1901, Annie duPont launched a project to transform the space into an early 20th-century formal garden.

The profiles of the terraces were restored; flower beds, shrubs, and trees were planted; and the brick garden walls, statuary, and ornamental iron gates were added. Annie's daughter, Marion duPont Scott, commissioned noted landscape architect Charles Gillette to design several perennial beds and introduced a number of unusual plants to the garden. Following Montpelier's acquisition by the National Trust for Historic Preservation in 1984, plantings were carefully identified and cataloged. Restoration of the garden began in October 1990, funded by The Garden Club of Virginia. ### 1-3:30 p.m. $\sim$ GASTON HALL

Located amid the rolling terrain and sweeping pastures of the Madison-Barbour Rural Historic District, Gaston Hall was completed in 1909 by William and Annie duPont, owners of neighboring Montpelier, for Annie's son, George Zinn, Jr. Local builder George Ficklin (1865-1917), who had supervised the duPonts' enlargement of Montpelier, designed and built the new brick manor house. From the original, extensive formal gardens, only old

boxwood and peonies remain, along with a charming garden temple, found at the end of a long drive. Building upon these elements, and relocating the original carriage house, the owners and landscape architect Rachel Lilly have created an ordered yet relaxed plan on three terraces, incorporating shrub borders, pool garden, perennial parterre and kitchen garden. The house is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Steven D. Brooks.

### Montpelier-Grelen Trail-for the Hikers in our Group!

The 3.9-mile Montpelier-Grelen Trail links Montpelier's trail system to Grelen Nursery's trail system over a route that traverses Chicken Mountain. A partnership between Montpelier, Grelen Nursery, and Piedmont Environmental Council, the Montpelier-Grelen Trail was designated a "Virginia Treasure" by the Office of the Governor in 2015 in recognition for its outstanding contribution to conservation, cultural heritage, and public outdoor recreation. Highlights include views of the Blue Ridge and Southwest Mountains, in addition to the food and entertainment offerings provided at Montpelier's <u>David M. **Exchange Hotel Museum**, 400 S. Main St, Gordonsville. Before the Civil War, the hotel welcomed passengers from two rail lines. Soon war began and it became a hospital, which provided care for 70,000 soldiers. After the war, it served the newly freed slaves as a Freedman's Bureau Hospital. Now fully re-stored, it is a museum dedicated to the Civil War era. Arts Center in Orange, 129 E Main St., Orange. Established in 1997, town mayor Bob Morin donated his Main Street building to The Arts Center four years later, giving it a home. In 2017 further renovations were made, including the addition of a dedicated ceramics studio.
